

# HCA Healthcare Political Participation Overview

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## Political participation overview

HCA Healthcare participates in the political process to help educate policymakers, shape public policy, and address proposals and legislation that impact the patients and communities we serve. We are subject to extensive regulation at the federal, state, and local levels and are involved in a number of legislative initiatives across a broad spectrum of policy areas that can have a significant effect on the patients and communities we serve, our employees, and our business and operations. We ethically and constructively promote legislative and regulatory actions that further the objectives of HCA Healthcare, such as improving access and quality of care.

Government Relations employs a number of tools to educate policymakers, including direct lobbying and participation in trade associations and coalitions with other healthcare organizations. These advocacy tools are implemented pursuant to our compliance protocols, consistent with our Company's Code of Conduct, and in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.

Our Company's [Code of Conduct](#) and Government Relations policies ([GR.001](#), [GR.002](#)) provide guidance to help ensure our work is done in an ethical and legal manner. Government Relations assesses HCA Healthcare's compliance needs, updates our policies as appropriate, and invests resources to ensure applicable standards are met. Additional information regarding the applicable provisions of the Company's Code of Conduct; our policies and procedures regarding political giving; and our political action committee (PAC), lobbying, and trade association activities is set forth below.

HCA Healthcare's Senior Vice President (SVP) - Government Relations has final authority over HCA Healthcare's political spending decisions. Our Government Relations team, which reports to our SVP - Government Relations, oversees regulatory matters and government affairs, including our direct and indirect advocacy and political contributions in the United States at the federal, state, and local levels.

Our political activities are also subject to oversight by our Board of Directors. The duties of our Nominating and Corporate Governance Committee (comprised solely of independent directors), pursuant to its written charter, include reviewing and considering the Company's policies and practices regarding political activities, including political contributions and lobbying. The Board reviews periodic reports of the Company's political expenditures prepared by the SVP - Government Relations.

HCA Healthcare publishes and archives on our website semi-annual reports regarding political contributions and related activity.

## Lobbying activity

Federal, state, and local statutes and regulations (e.g., the Lobbying Disclosure Act and Honest Leadership and Open Government Act) govern our corporate lobbying activities and require the Company and its representatives to disclose relevant advocacy activity to the public and abide by applicable gift and ethics rules governing engagement with public officials and employees. Outside legal counsel prepares and files required reports for our in-house federal lobbyists. Lobbying reports for external federal lobbyists are reviewed by HCA Healthcare's SVP - Government Relations. Federal lobbying reports filed by HCA Healthcare are publicly available at [lobbyingdisclosure.house.gov](http://lobbyingdisclosure.house.gov).

Lobbying reports for our state lobbyists are reviewed and approved by the state's respective Government Relations Director and filed in the respective state. State lobbying disclosure records are also generally available for public review via state government websites and online filing platforms managed by the state lobbying regulatory authority for each jurisdiction. ## Trade associations

HCA Healthcare supports trade associations that represent a broad spectrum of views on industry and policy issues.

Lobbying and maintaining memberships in trade associations are important parts of participating effectively in the political process. We believe the associations in which we participate take positions and address policy issues in a collective industry manner and often advance positions consistent with HCA Healthcare's interests. However, participation in the political process and as a member of various trade associations comes with the understanding that we may not always agree with all of the positions of the organizations in which we participate, the other members of those organizations, and the stakeholders and policymakers with whom those organizations communicate.

Below is a breakdown of dues in excess of \$25,000 paid by HCA Healthcare and its affiliates to trade associations between January 1 and June 30, 2025. The total shown represents the amount that was allocated to non-deductible lobbying activity under the Internal Revenue Code.

## Political contributions overview

HCA Healthcare sponsors a federal PAC – the HCA Healthcare Good Government Fund – which is a voluntary, non-partisan, separate segregated fund (SSF), regulated by the Federal Election Commission (FEC). Our in-house PAC administrators attend periodic FEC conferences to learn of recent developments in campaign finance law and best practices for FEC filings and compliance.

Contributions to the HCA Healthcare Good Government Fund are strictly voluntary. Disbursements from the PAC are made to election committees of federal office candidates and other PACs. Disbursements can also be made to state candidates or other state PACs where it is permitted and where HCA Healthcare does not operate an existing state PAC. HCA Healthcare participates in the political process by contributing to state and local candidates, political party committees, political committees, and other political organizations. HCA Healthcare's political contributions and expenditures are made to promote the Company's interests and without regard to the personal political preferences of individual HCA Healthcare board members, officers, and employees. Decisions regarding political contributions are based on a number of factors, such as our belief that the recipient shares our commitment to improving patient access to timely and high-quality healthcare, expanding the availability of healthcare coverage, ensuring appropriate Medicare and Medicaid reimbursement levels, and promoting nurse and physician education.

HCA Healthcare does not make independent expenditures in connection with federal elections. HCA Healthcare operates 15 individual state PACs in 13 states where we have healthcare operations. Each of these state PACs has its own board of directors and operates in accordance with applicable state law, but each PAC, whether federal or state, operates under uniform bylaws. Where permissible, the state PACs are funded by local HCA Healthcare facilities and affiliates.

All disbursements, receipts, and reporting for HCA Healthcare's federal and state PACs are managed through an enhanced PAC compliance, tracking, and reporting software system, which is designed to ensure that all contributions meet both federal and state compliance requirements and receive the required approval authorization.

HCA Healthcare's affiliated PACs are also subject to review by the Internal Audit Department after each federal election to ensure compliance with laws and HCA Healthcare policies. These reports are shared with responsible Government Relations personnel and with HCA Healthcare's senior management team.

HCA Healthcare abides by applicable federal, state, and local laws concerning contribution disclosure for any political candidates, parties, and committees. A chart reflecting all corporate contributions made by HCA Healthcare and its affiliates to political candidates, parties, and committees between January 1, 2025, and June 30, 2025, is included below. Separate lists of all such contributions by the HCA Healthcare Good Government Fund and HCA Healthcare's affiliated state PACs for the same time period are also included.
